67 years ago in November 1957 it was Soviet Russia that launched the world's first inhabited space capsule, Sputnik II, which carried a dog named Laika into space.



The Play about two First Ladies, one an eastern European ex-model, the other an older woman who has married a much younger man, hears their views on their husbands and men in general. The Two Ladies, wives of two world leaders, are effectively sidelined in an upstairs room and, after a frosty start, eventually open up and share their opinions.










New Service for Herts Residents

A new community dementia service for residents experiencing memory loss has launched in Hertfordshire. Memory Support Hertfordshire is a new service that is funded by Hertfordshire County Council and will be run by a new partnership between Alzheimer's Society, Age UK Hertfordshire and Carers in Herts.

The service is available to Hertfordshire residents aged 18 years old and above who may have memory concerns whether they have a diagnosis of dementia or not. It is also open to carers. Those using the service will benefit from:



- a single point of information and advice where users can get advice on all aspects of local support for memory loss and dementia
- access to a range of groups offering a range of activities to support people with Mild Cognitive Impairment and dementia and informal carers
- tailored individual support to help people to live well with dementia
- carer support groups and advice a chance to relax and share ideas with a group who can relate to your experiences
- young onset dementia support tailored support for those who are living with or supporting someone with dementia who is under 65, as well as other rarer forms of dementia
- Admiral Nurses when things get challenging or difficult, Admiral nurses work alongside the family carers of people with all types of dementia giving them one-to-one support, expert guidance and practical solutions
- training courses and information sessions to carers and people with dementia, and to those who work with them. Training will also be

- available to people and organisations who wish to become more dementia aware
- dementia friendly communities working with the new dementia friendly Hertfordshire accreditation scheme, supporting communities and businesses to make Hertfordshire a place to live well with dementia


The service works with partners in the community, as well as with health and social care partners, to best serve the interests of the people who use community support services. People can self-refer into the service via the Memory Support Hertfordshire website.

E-Scooters - Know the Rules

When it comes to their local use, it seems that, in general, the jury is still out on the benefits of E Scooters. But when we asked around for opinions, surprisingly, many people that would consider using an E-Scooter don't actually know the rules. According to news reports, E-Scooters are being seized and destroyed by police in Hertfordshire, so if you are thinking about getting and riding on an E-Scooter, it's best to know the rules.

The most important thing to note is that E-Scooters are classed as motor vehicles under the Road Traffic Act 1988. This means the rules that apply to motor vehicles, also apply to E-Scooters, including the need to have a licence, insurance and tax.

It's not currently possible to get insurance for privately owned E-Scooters, which means it's illegal to use them on the road or in public spaces. If you're using a private E-Scooter, you risk the vehicle being seized under S.165 Road Traffic Act 1988 for no insurance.

If you cause serious harm to another person whilst riding an e-scooter, the incident will be investigated in the same way it would if you were riding a motorcycle or driving a car.

Rental E-Scooter trials

Trials of rental E-Scooters are taking place in the UK. Anyone using a rental E-Scooter on a public road or other public space, has to comply with the relevant road traffic legislation or they face potential prosecution.

To rent an E-Scooter you must:

- meet the minimum age limit; these can vary depending on the provider, so please check with them
- hold the correct driving licence (category Q or P/M)
- create an account with the rental company
- E-Scooters can only be used in approved areas.



Train Delays

A lthough staff and drivers have been awarded the pay rises that they requested, it seems that there are still problems. It seems that recently, a train operator warned of delays and cancellations to services due to a "shortage of train crew". Passengers who need to travel were advised to leave an extra 30 minutes to complete their journeys.

It was a few weeks ago that Thameslink said services on multiple routes would be disrupted and advised customers to check if their journey would be affected, with alternative routes available at no extra cost.

The routes affected;-

Brighton/Three Bridges to Bedford/Cambridge (via London St Pancras)

Horsham/London Kings Cross to Peterborough Moorgate to Welwyn Garden City Hopefully these delays and staff shortages have

all been sorted out by now, but it's probably best to check before you travel.

Local Loos

We really can't recall the exact date, but it seems that it was some time ago that a lone trouble maker or a group of trouble makers had set fire to our local public toilets. Since then,

as far as I know, refurbishment of some sort has begun as the attached images show. However, a local lady told us that the loos are still in a very poor state of repair and feel damp and dank and generally unpleasant and so really do need a coat or two of paint.

Fireworks and Bonfires



November 5th is fireworks night or some call it Guy Fawkes Day, but whatever you call it we have bonfires and set off fireworks which essentially commemorates the Gunpowder Plot of 1605, when Guy Fawkes and fellow Catholic conspirators attempted to blow up Parliament and kill James I of England and the royal family. Guy Fawkes was born in York in 1570, the son of Edward, a church lawyer and prominent Protestant in the city, and Edith, whose family included secret Catholics. He had two brothers, John and Christopher. At that time,

it was dangerous to be Catholic: many plots and rebellions against Elizabeth I were led by Catholics, which led to severe reprisals. Priests who were caught leading secret services were tortured and executed.

To all outward appearances, the Fawkes were a law-abiding Protestant family, until Edward Fawkes died when Guy was 8 years old. His mother remarried, this time to a Catholic, Dionysius Bainbridge. The young Guy was drawn strongly to his stepfather's religion, and although he knew of the dangers, he converted to Catholicism.

With the new monarch on the throne, Catholics across the country apparently hoped for the end of the religious persecution that they had suffered for so long. But they were soon disappointed as the Protestant James I wasn't a tolerant King. So it was that a group of conspirators, with Guy Fawkes among them, decided on a drastic measure. The plan was to blow up Parliament during its State Opening on 5 November, when





James I, the Queen and his heir would also be present, and so all would be killed. It seems that apart from Fawkes, an explosives expert from his military days, no one in the group knew much about gunpowder. Of course, Fawkes was chosen to set the fuse in the cellars underneath the Houses of Parliament. The plan very nearly succeeded. It was only thanks to an anonymous letter to the authorities, received in late October, that the King, his family and his Protestant ministers were not all murdered. Royal guards searched The House of Lords at midnight and in the early hours of 5 November, Fawkes was discovered in the cellars. with a fuse, a small lamp, a box of matches and 36 poorly-hidden barrels of gunpowder. To this day, there is still a ceremonial search before the State Opening of Parliament, when the Yeomen of the Guard look for hidden explosives in the cellars of the Palace of Westminster. In January 1606 James I passed a thanksgiving act to celebrate the failure of the Gunpowder Plot and his deliverance from danger. Called the Observance of 5 November Act 1605, it involved a special church service, bonfires and fireworks. It remained in force until 1859, although we still celebrate firework night today.

We went out and about in our area to find out if people still celebrate firework night and, if they do, how they spend the evening.


Flossy and Mrs P told us: "We have a few sparklers in the garden and my husband saves some logs for us to set up a bonfire, but apart from that we often go to the St Albans Fireworks display as it really is so marvellous. Flossy sits on her dad's shoulders so she doesn't miss a thing."

Miss C and Mr F said: "We love firework night and over the past few years we have had a bonfire party at home, inviting a few friends who each bring a box of fireworks. Tom sets them off and we drink flaming punch and toast marsh mallows. It's great fun, but it all changes if it rains, so fingers crossed for lovely non rainy weather this year."

Mr & Mrs D said: "Of course we know about the gun powder plot, when we were young we used to make a 'Guy' using old clothes stuffed with straw to make a 'guy'. The guy would sit ontop of the bonfire and just go up in smoke – but those traditions seem to be long gone now. But it's become a bit of a tradition to take our grandson to a fireworks display somewhere, there are usually some very good ones around here."

Mrs R said: "Fireworks night? No, I can't say that I celebrate it. I make sure that my cats are indoors because it can be scary for them. I do look out of my window through, as my neighbours often seem to have fireworks."




Kidney Stones

Kidney stones are small mineral deposits formed in your kidneys, also made up of acid salts.

According to Bupa UK, Kidney stones are common – five to 10 in 100 people are affected by pain associated with kidney stones at some point in their life. Most people who get kidney stones for the first time are aged between 20 and 50. The human body has two kidneys, which 'clean' your blood by filtering out water and waste products to make urine. Kidney stones can form when there's a build-up of salts or minerals in your urine. These minerals form crystals, which are often too small to notice and pass harmlessly out of your body. However, over time, the crystals can build up inside your kidney to form a kidney stone.

Most kidney stones (about four out of five) are made up of calcium salts (calcium oxalate or calcium phosphate or both). They can also be made up of other substances including uric acid, cystine and struvite. They vary in size from very small stones under 2mm to large ones over 1cm. Kidney stones may stay where they're first formed. But they can move out of your kidney into your ureter – the tube that carries urine from your kidney to your bladder. If they get stuck





in your ureter, they can cause severe pain, known as renal colic. Depending on a stone's size and position, it can stop you passing urine easily and lead to infection.

Types of kidney stones

Kidney stones come in a variety of sizes, shapes and colours. Some are like grains of sand, while in rare cases others can grow to the size of a golf ball.

The main types of kidney stones are:

Calcium stones, the most common type of stone Struvite stones, usually caused by an infection, like a urine infection Uric acid stones, usually caused by a large amount of acid in your urine

Symptoms

A person with kidney stones doesn't experience many symptoms until the stone is moving around in his/her kidney or passes through the ureter, which is the tube connecting the kidney and the bladder. In such cases, amongst the symptoms are:

- Severe pain in the side and back, below the ribs and pain in the lower abdomen and groin
- Painful urination
- Urine that's pink, red or brown
- Urine that smells very foul
- Nausea

Prevention

The best way to prevent kidney stones is to make sure you drink plenty of water each day to avoid becoming dehydrated. To prevent stones returning, you should aim to drink up to 3 litres (5.2 pints) of fluid throughout the day, every day. You're advised to:

drink water, but drinks like tea and coffee also

count

- add fresh lemon juice to your water
- avoid fizzy drinks
- · do not eat too much salt



Keeping your urine clear helps to stop waste products getting too concentrated and forming stones. You can tell how diluted your urine is by looking at its colour. The darker your urine is, the more concentrated it is. Your urine is usually a dark yellow colour in the morning because it contains a build-up of waste products that your body's produced overnight. Drinks like tea, coffee and fruit juice can count towards your fluid

intake, but water is the healthiest option and is best for preventing kidney stones developing. You should also make sure you drink more when it's hot or when you're exercising to replace fluids lost through sweating.

Treating kidney stones

Most kidney stones are small enough to be passed in your pee, and it may be possible to treat the symptoms at home with medication. Larger stones may need to be broken up or removed with surgery.

It's estimated up to half of all people who have had kidney stones will experience them again within the following 5 years.

You should contact a GP or NHS 111 immediately if:

- you're in severe pain
- you have a high temperature
- you have an episode of shivering or shaking you have blood in your urine
